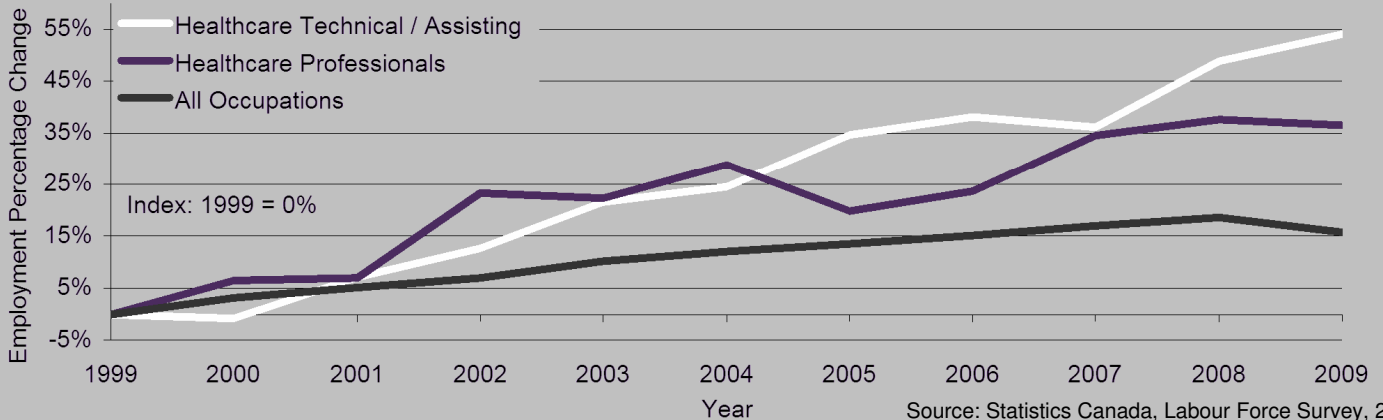
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Employment Trend

Ontario Health Care Occupations and All Occupations, 1999 to 2009

A decade ago, the workforces of healthcare professionals and technical / assisting workers were nearly equal in size. Since then, technical / assisting workers have grown by 54%, while professionals (which includes registered nurses) have grown by 37%. Each group of healthcare workers has outgrown the provincial average, and technical / assisting occupations have continued to expand even in the recent economic downturn.

Health Care Occupations and All Occupations Ontario, 1999 and 2009

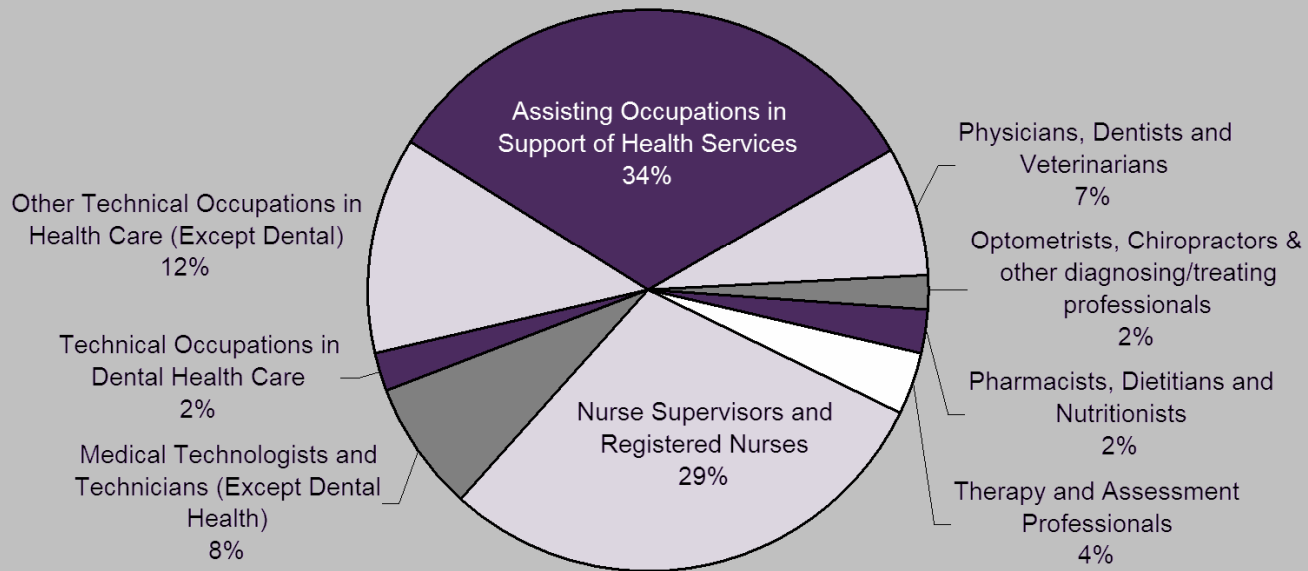


The average tenure (length with one employer) of healthcare professionals is 139 weeks while the average for technical / assisting workers is 95 weeks, having slipped to just below the 101 week average of all occupations.

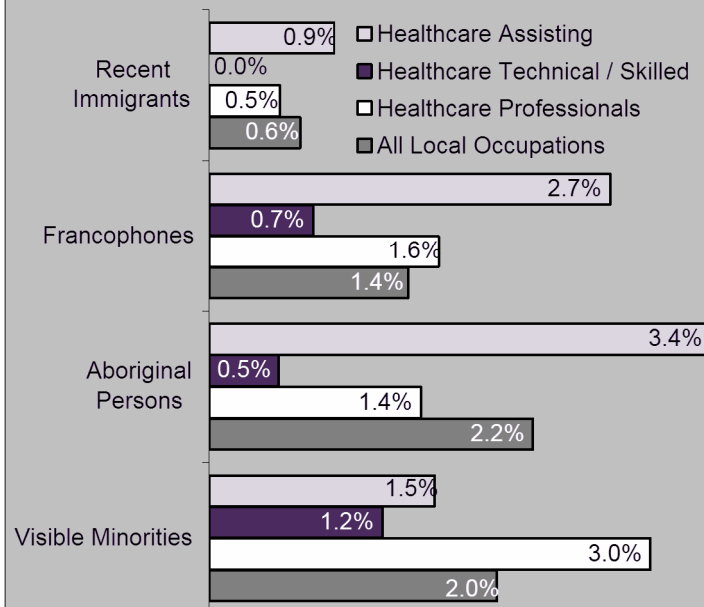
